GOSPEL

John 11:3–7, 17, 20–27, 31–45

A reading from the holy gospel according to John

Martha and her sister Mary sent a message to the Lord and told him that his good friend Lazarus was sick.

When Jesus heard this, he said, "His sickness won't end in death. It will bring glory to God and his Son."

Jesus loved Martha and her sister and brother. But he stayed where he was for two more days. Then he said to his disciples, "Now we'll go back to Judea."

When Jesus got to Bethany,
he found that Lazarus had already been in the tomb four days.
When Martha heard that Jesus had arrived,
she went out to meet him,
but Mary stayed in the house.
Martha said to Jesus, "Lord, if you had been here,
my brother would not have died.
Yet even now I know that God will do anything you ask."

Jesus told her, "Your brother will live again!"

Martha answered,
"I know that he will be raised to life on the last day,
when all the dead are raised."

Jesus then said,
"I am the one who raises the dead to life!
Everyone who has faith in me will live,
even if they die.
And everyone who lives because of faith in me will never die.

When Jesus saw that Mary and the people with her were crying, he was terribly upset and asked, "Where have you put his body?"

Some of them said, "He gives sight to the blind. Why couldn't he have kept Lazarus from dying?"

Jesus was still terribly upset.
So he went to the tomb,
